

#### Health Care Opportunities Program (HCOP) Collaboration

HCOP is a pipeline program that provides career support and mentorship to students who are underrepresented in the medical and public health fields. Tiffany Hogan and Stephanie Sanchez, pictured left, have been working with the CHW Academy to gain exposure within the public health field, and contribute to our Train the Trainer project, a project through which we are gathering and developing resources to cultivate strong, well-rounded CHW trainers. 





" [I'm choosing] the podcast Historically Black!

## **Community Health Work Field Updates**

#### <u>Community Health Field Updates</u>

California Department of Health Care Access & Information (HCAI) to Determine & Set CHW

Certification Process!

Given that CHW services are now billable through Medi-Cal, the California Department of Health Care Access & Information (HCAI) is working to develop a certification process for CHW/P/Rs. To determine training and certification requirements and guidelines, HCAI has been intentional about engaging with stakeholders like the CHWA. For more information please visit HCAI's Website.

HCAI completed one-on-one interviews with stakeholders to determine what questions and topics they would primarily focus on as they prepared for listening sessions.

The third round of listening sessions took place in March in a slightly different format, where each listening session was stakeholder-specific (e.g. a session for employers & supervisors, another one for training entities, a separate one for tribal groups, etc.)

HCAI gathered information through online listening sessions, online information sessions, and in-person sessions for all stakeholders. The first two rounds of listening sessions were open to all and took place in early 2023.

In-person listening sessions took place between March and April throughout different communities in California including Los Angeles, Stockton, and San Diego. The second information session is tentatively taking place in May.

Please note: The CHWA has participated by attending listening sessions since February and encourages all stakeholders, specially CHWs, to join these discussion.

Final decisions regarding certification and training programs are set to be out in the summer, the Certification Site is set to be available by August of this year. Stay-tuned for more updates!

What does this mean for the Academy?

Because we have developed our core training based on the nationally approved C3 standards and competencies, we are very confident that our core training will meet future HCAI requirements for certification.

How does this impact our CHW Academy alumni?

Academy Alumni may be able to receive a CHW state-issued certificate based on the CHWA training & certificate they already have. This will be important if CHWs are providing Medi-Cal reimbursable services.
